Awareness plus action equals prevention

Intimate partner violence spilling over into the workplace costs American businesses an estimated three to four billion dollars a year in lost time and productivity. Join the ranks of organizations proactively implementing policies and procedures to prevent violence in the workplace.

According to Mr. Rugala, "Violence is evolutionary. It builds over time and is often preceded by behaviors which might suggest a propensity for future violence." Working from a mind-set of awareness, however, employees learn how to recognize "behaviors of concern" that can lead to violence.

Domestic violence is epidemic in our nation and has been dubbed South Carolina's number one crime by Attorney General Henry McMaster. Learn ways to keep this crime from spilling into your South Carolina workplace.

"Murders at work by disgruntled employees occur much less frequently than other types of violence. It is the threats, harassment, domestic violence, physical and emotional abuse, stalking and intimidation that, if left unchecked, may result in more serious violent behavior. These are the behaviors that supervisors have to deal with every day."
